When the short-term view looks dismal...

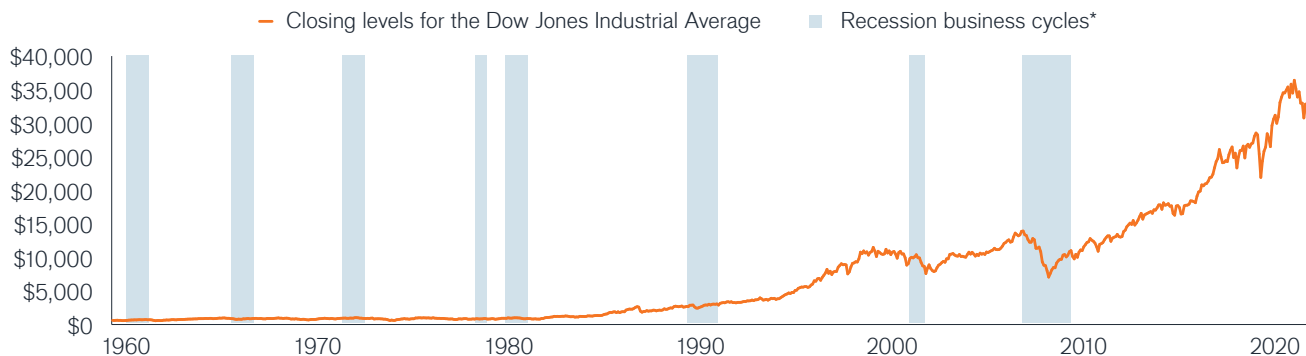
